Exciting New History Group

More than half of those who returned recent questionnaires (see below) indicated that they would be interested in a Local History group. Other members of the local community had expressed a similar interest. In response to this, an open meeting was held in the Community Room on March 28th. Twenty people attended the initial meeting and a number of others, unable to attend, had expressed an interest. In response to the level of interest, a small steering group was formed, who will be putting forward some suggestions/areas of activity that the group might like to research. The focus for the first year might be *Life in Thorncombe in the Mid Nineteenth Century* with the possibility of an exhibition in the village sometime in 2008. A second meeting will be held in the **Community Room on May 11**th at 7.30. Everyone is welcome – not only TVT members. The TVT has agreed to help with any initial set-up costs incurred. However, it was recognised at the initial meeting that this independent group will need to consider ways of financing itself in the longer term.

If you have an interest in the history of the parish do come along to the meeting. We would welcome ideas and the opportunity to share knowledge and enthusiasms. We all have a lot to learn and it is more fun to do it together.

An amazing bat story

Experts in Bristol were amazed to discover that a 3 month old greater horseshoe bat flew from her colony in Gloucestershire, and arrived at a new roost in Dorset. 'The endangered greater horseshoe bat is a sedentary species and not prone to travelling far from its roost, making this one bat's journey all the more surprising. Although there are rare instances of greater horseshoe bats that have flown even further than this, they have generally been males, which have taken considerably longer to cover the distance - up to two years - to find new colonies to mate with.' 

Please sit on the bench and enjoy the wonderful view when walking in the area, - and remember John.






The Trust's Trees

Since its earliest days the Trust has been actively involved in tree planting. During the last autumn and winter we have carried out a progress check on the majority of our trees. Where needed stakes & ties have been removed, damaged & over hanging branches pruned and undergrowth cleared. In undertaking this work we are delighted to report that we found our trees generally thriving and are making a significant contribution to our parish landscape. Some new planting took place, including two oaks on land opposite the school to mark the Trust's twentieth anniversary.

We have also sought advice from the Dorset Wildlife Trust (DWT), concerning the management of Johnson's Wood. This large planting comprising some 300 trees took place in the winter of 1997/98. The woodland occupies a sloping site close to the stile entry to 'The Dungeon' and borders the footpath running from Wittey's Lane to Sadborow Pound. The DWT confirmed that it is now a well-established planting that could benefit from some coppicing and other woodland management techniques to create a more diverse environment for wildlife.
